



Tech, Tools, & Tips

In this recurring column, Janet will describe some of her favorite free or low cost technology, tools, and tips that may be of interest to the CCBS community.

Podcast Your Papers: Introducing NotebookLM

Do you listen to podcasts, whether for professional growth or just for fun? I'll admit, I was late to the podcast bandwagon—an industry that, in 2024, boasts over 546 million listeners and an estimated 4.36 million shows worldwide, with a staggering \$4.02 billion spent on podcast ads. While I don't quite match the average listener's 7-hour weekly commitment, I do count myself among the 47% of U.S. adults aged 12 and older who tune in to a podcast at least once a month (all data from Singh, 2024). But with the rise of AI tools that simplify so many aspects of the podcast experience, I just might be listening—and creating—more podcasts very soon.

I'm going to give a quick summary of various podcast tools before homing in on one in more detail. On the production side, free and paid tools like *ChatGPT* assist with scripting and brainstorming, while platforms such as *Descript* and *Adobe Audition* clean audio and improve sound quality. Need a voice? *ElevenLabs* can clone voices for quick touch-ups or *Podcastle* can create full-length audio. For accessibility, tools like *Otter.ai* and *Riverside* automate transcription and captioning, (see a helpful rundown of these tools and links for access at [Best AI Podcasting Tools](#) or [AI Tools for Podcasters: The Ultimate List for 2024](#)).

For help with listening and learning (which I confess, I sometimes need help with), AI-powered apps summarize episodes, highlight key moments, and recommend tailored content. These tools can help us get more out of podcast content in less time, though they may miss some of the nuances or carefully crafted details intended by podcasters. *Snipd* stands out by saving key insights, generating summaries, and even allowing you to "chat" with episodes. *ListenNotes* serves as a podcast search engine, helping you find episodes on specific topics. For personalized recommendations, tools such as *Podyssey* curate content based on your listening habits. Free tools such as *Restream* or *Clipto.AI* offer transcription features, making it easy to scan for specific moments. Whether you're listening to learn, work, or unwind—or even brainstorming and repurposing content—these AI tools ensure you get the most out of your podcast time.

Now on to a tool I'm really excited to share with you: [NotebookLM](#). This experimental product from Google feels like a smart grad student or research assistant (or personalized AI assistant) that understands your research, publications, documents, and notes. It pretty accurately summarizes lengthy material into concise takeaways. You can ask questions about your content and [NotebookLM](#) will provide targeted answers based on your work. It supports idea generation by making connections between your notes, suggesting avenues for further thought (or potential research??). It also helps with organization, identifying key themes, creating outlines, and structuring information effectively. But all that is not why I'm covering it today.


What really sets [NotebookLM](#) apart—and the reason I'm highlighting it—is its exciting podcast creation capability. This isn't just a standard text-to-speech tool; it generates a conversational podcast based on your work—whether it's a publication, presentation text, or notes on a topic. Using two AI voices (often a male and female host), it creates a natural, engaging dialogue that discusses, elaborates on, and highlights the



key points of your document. Instead of simply reading or summarizing your notes, the AI produces a scripted conversation that makes the content more engaging and dynamic, and perhaps even easier to remember (now that would be an interesting a research question).

Yeah, but... How good is it really? Longtime CCBS Trustee Dr. T. V. Joe Layng called it “quite remarkable, **NotebookLM** [is a] study guide and podcast generator that can be used with articles, outlines, PowerPoints, videos, etc. Simply drop in a file and it creates an entire study guide for it, including a podcast” (personal communication). To showcase its capabilities, Joe shared [a link to a podcast](#) about a (“very challenging”) Alternative Sets article (Goldiamond, 1975), completely created by AI in only a few minutes.

Of course I had to try it for myself. Thinking about how much we all miss Dr. Henry S. Pennypacker, “Hank” the former Chair of our Board of Directors, it occurred to me that a podcast of Hank’s omnibus chapter, “*Reinforcement in the Key of C*” might be just the thing many of us want to hear. So, I combined Hank’s chapter and his and Executive Director Dr. Rob Holdsambeck’s Preface “*Up from the Ashes*” and started the process. I...



1. Logged into Google’s **NotebookLM** (<https://notebooklm.google.com/>)
2. Created a new notebook (clicked the + sign)
3. Uploaded the PDF file (of the Preface and Hank’s chapter)
4. Marveled at the almost instantaneous text summary (see inset box below)
5. Clicked the  **Audio Overview** button to create the podcast.
6. Waited while “Generating conversation...This may take a few minutes.” (3 minutes 17 seconds to be exact)
7. Played a few minutes of the podcast beginning then downloaded the file.
8. Listened to the entire file (with delight) during my next car drive (@ 24 min).

Curious about what the podcast says?

Click the button to play or download the .wav file to listen using your favorite media player.

In the podcast a male and a female moderator discuss Hank’s contributions in an engaging, surprisingly natural way. Perhaps some of you won’t immediately download the file and give it a listen, so I thought I’d entice you with a transcript* from a couple minutes at the end.

Male moderator: *And, you know, I think Pennypacker’s story is really a testament to the potential of behavioral science to address so many of the challenges we face.*

Female moderator: *Right, from education to health care.*

M: *Yeah. He had this remarkable ability to combine scientific rigor with a deep compassion for helping others.*

F: *Yeah. He was able to connect those two things.*

M: *And it’s a legacy that continues to inspire.*

F: *So, what does this all mean for us, the listeners? You know, what can we take away from Pennypacker’s journey?*

M: *Well, I think his story shows us that, you know, a deep understanding of behavior combined*

with a willingness to challenge conventions can unlock solutions to problems that might seem really daunting.

F: It's like he's saying, you know, don't be afraid to think outside the box, to question assumptions, to look for those hidden patterns that connect seemingly unrelated things.

M: Exactly. And it encourages us to think about how we might apply a behavioral approach to our own lives.

F: Like how...so give me an example.

M: Well, maybe it's improving productivity, learning a new skill, or even tackling a health challenge.

F: Yeah.

M: You know, the tools and principles are there for anyone to explore.

F: Wow. This has been really eye-opening, I think. You know, this deep dive into the life of H. S. Pennypacker.

F: It's a reminder that, you know, science isn't just about abstract theories.

M: Right.

F: It's about using knowledge to make a real difference in the world.

F: And who knows? Maybe some of you listening will be inspired to apply a little behavioral science to your own lives.

M: That'd be great.

F: Thanks for joining us.

I think Hank would agree, “...**It's about using knowledge to make a real difference in the world.**”

The possibilities with this pretty amazing, free-to-use AI technology (available with a Google account) are almost endless. From creating audio files and listening offline or on the go to summarizing, reviewing information, and generating study guides, timelines, FAQs, and more, it's a tool with wide-ranging applications. And it's worth remembering—these are just the capabilities we have access to today. Many of these tools continue to advance, so the future likely holds even more exciting developments, perhaps even innovations we can't yet imagine. I encourage you to dive in and experiment with these tools—you might be surprised at how much they can simplify your work, help you learn new things, spark creativity, or even open up new possibilities for research, teaching, training, writing, and...podcasting.

*In case you're curious, I used the free online tool, [Restream](#), to convert the audio file to text. Although it did not identify the two different speakers, it was quite accurate and quick.

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
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Involvement & Investments Survey of Advisors & Trustees



Behavior and Philosophy publishes articles dedicated to theoretical issues concerning behavior analysis as well as allied behavior sciences (e.g., conceptual analysis; methodological discussions; reflections on epistemology and ontology; ethical and political investigations).

All manuscripts in accordance with *Behavior and Philosophy*'s scope will be considered for publication after a double-blind review process by two anonymous reviewers invited by the Editor for the task.

Behavior and Philosophy adopts the continuous publishing model of publication. Finished the copy-editing process, articles accepted for publication will be published [online on Behavior and Philosophy site](#) in a continuous flow. The journal volumes will be closed by the end of each year with the papers published during this period. The continuous publication process promotes speed and agility in the process of availability of research. In case of manuscripts accepted for publication, it takes 3 months on average between submission and the publication online.
